Summer Sermon Series "The Parables Of Jesus"

"All these things Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed, he said nothing to them without a parable." (Matthew 13:34, ESV)

I love a good story. And my favorite ones usually have something to do with my good old Uncle Ole. Like the time when Ole walked into the doctor's office in his hometown in Minnesota. The receptionist said, "Can I help you?" Ole said, "I need to talk to da doctor." The receptionist said, "What do you need to talk to him about?" Ole said, "I got da shingles." She said, "Why don't you just sit down over there and someone will come and talk to you."

About a half hour later, a nurse came up to Ole and asked, "So, tell me, what is it that you have?" Again, Ole said, "I got da shingles." The nurse said, "Okay. Why don't you go into that room over there, get undressed, and put on one of the gowns that are on the counter." So that is what Ole did.

He waited another half hour, and finally the doctor came in. The doctor said, "Hi there, Ole, good to see you. Now tell me again, what is it that you have?" Ole said, "Like I told da lady out front, and like I told da nurse, I have da shingles." The doctor said, "And exactly where are the shingles?" Ole said, "Dey are out in my truck. Da lumberyard told me to bring 'em here and ask you where you wanted me to stack 'em."

The point of the story is that, if you really want to understand what a person is saying, it's always important to ask a few more questions. And that's kind of what the parables of Jesus are all about.

Jesus was thirty years old when he was baptized by John the Baptist. That was the beginning of his public preaching and teaching ministry. That ministry would last for three years, up until his death, resurrection, and ascension into heaven when he was thirty-three. In the early part of those three years, the teaching of Jesus was pretty clear and straightforward. But it also led to a great deal of controversy.

The religious leaders of the day, primarily the Scribes and Pharisees, began to challenge and attack Jesus. They were angry because he did not follow all of their manmade traditions. And they were also jealous, because crowds of people were following Jesus and wondering if he might be the long-awaited Messiah, the Savior of Israel.

So about halfway through his three-year ministry, Jesus changed his method of teaching in public. Instead of teaching with plain theological statements, Jesus began to share important spiritual truths through parables. Jesus knew that most of the religious leaders would simply dismiss his folksy stories as the simplistic ramblings of a country preacher. But he also knew that the people who *really* wanted to understand his teaching would come to him and ask questions. And those people would hear the powerful spiritual truths that were buried deep in the stories.

During this latter part of the spring and throughout the summer I thought it might be fun to walk through several of these parables with you. Bible scholars have identified about thirty or so parables of Jesus, along with some brief illustrations that could be classified as "mini parables." I'm not going to try to cover all of them in this sermon series. But I will look at about twenty of them. I will dig into the cultural context of the parables, so that you can have a better understanding of what

the people of that day would have heard when Jesus told these stories. And I will try to apply the truths of the parables to our time and our context.

I hope you can join us for all or most of this series. I know that summer brings many fun activities and vacations. But when you are in town, I look forward to seeing you in worship so that we can all explore these fascinating and insightful stories together!


Youth & Education – Working on volunteers for VBS, end of year Sunday School Teachers meeting.
